

**New Car Sales
In North Carolina**

Greensboro, Dec. 1.—Although new car sales in North Carolina for October were less than the record-breaking total for that period last year the ten month 1926 total is still in excess of 1925, according to figures announced today by Coleman W. Roberts, vice-president of the Carolina Motor Club.

Guilford led the North Carolina counties with 419 sales in October, trailed by Forsyth, 377; Mecklenburg, 313; Wake 298.

South Carolina sales for October were 3,230 compared with 2,892 in

1925, a gain of 505. Of this number 1,888 were Fords and 705 Chevrolets. Florence led the counties with 270 while Richland trailed with 198; Charleston, 197; and Greenville 176.

**665 Women Prisoners
In State Jails**

Raleigh, Dec. 1.—Is it economy to permit 665 women prisoners to sit idly in the various jails of the state and do nothing, when they could be made economically productive thru the establishment of a farm colony for women offenders? This is the question Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, commissioner of public welfare, is asking these days, and with good cause, too, as she maintains that it is a hopeless task to reform this number of women, a large portion of them prostitutes, by keeping them idly in jail. But she does maintain that if they were sent to a farm colony, where they might be kept busy and out of doors much of the time, with proper medical attention, many of them could be returned to society and made useful citizens again.

With this thought in view, the board will recommend to the state legislature the establishment of the Farm Colony for Delinquent Women. The bill, as it will be offered to the legislature, is designed to care eventually for four hundred women. This will be one of five recommended measures of the legislative council of Women, and has been approved by the North Carolina Conference for Social Service.
