Walnut Cove, March 25 .- The Lions Club of Stokes county enjoyed a splendid feed in the high school building here Monday evening. Geo. Fulton, of Walnut Cove, and Dr. R. H. Morefield, of Danbury, received their final initiatory degrees and became full-fledged Lions.

The following report of the Fair Committee was adopted by the Club, and the same committee, composed of Sheriff J. John Taylor, William Marshall and J. E. Trevathan, was asked to continue its activity in furtherance of the plans.

The Fair Committee reported as follows: The committee recommends, first that a County Fair Association be organized with at least one director from each township of Stokes county. 2.
