

**N. C. HAS 1,887  
1-ROOM SCHOOLS**

**But State Ranks Second In  
Eliminating This Type From  
System.**

Raleigh, April 15.—North Carolina now has only 1,887 one-room schools, 835 for white children and 1,052 for colored children, according to the current issue of State School Facts published by the State Department of Public Instruction.

According to the Office of Education, Washington, D. C., quoted by School Facts, there were 153,306 schools of this type in the United States in 1928. Since 1917-18 there has been a decrease of 42,094 one-room schools throughout the nation, 22,303 of which have been in the sixteen Southern States.

At present, Illinois has the largest number of one-room schools with 10,105 and Rhode Island the last with 97. Five other states each report more than 7,000 schools of this type; Iowa 9,585, Pennsylvania 7,821, Missouri 7,393, New York 7,350 and Kansas 7,200. Five other states, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska and Wisconsin, each has more than 6,000 one-room schools.

The North Carolina publication presents a table showing the number of one-room schools in the sixteen strictly Southern States for 1917-18 and 1927-28, the ten-year decrease in number of such schools and the per cent. of teachers in this type of school.

Georgia leads these states in eliminating the largest number, 4,915, since 1917-18; and

as a consequence, among these states, has the smallest percentage of her teachers employed in one-room schools. North Carolina ranks second in this respect among Southern States by having abandoned 2,774 one-room schools and thereby leaving only 8.1 per cent. of all teachers in such schools.

Kentucky now has 6,256 one-room schools, having eliminated only 949 since 1917-18, and as a result nearly 40 per cent. of Kentucky teachers are teaching in one-room schools.

**Mrs. McKimmon  
Honored By  
Student Loan Fund**

A student loan fund amounting now to nearly \$700 which will be used to help worthy 4-H girls pursue a college education in home economics has been established in honor of Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon thru the joint action of the North Carolina Home Demonstration Agents Association and the State Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs.

The movement had its inception in the heart and mind of Mrs. Estelle T. Smith, district agent, who in an address before the home agents at their conference in December 1927 suggested that such a fund might be started as a token of affection for Mrs. McKimmon and in recognition of her lifelong work for farm women and girls. The response was enthusiastic.

The agents' association then decided that the State Federation

of Home Demonstration Clubs might want a part in the movement and so the matter was presented to them. At first the federation agreed to donate \$50 each year. This was done the first but at the annual meeting held in July, 1929, the farm women were so enthusiastic over the matter that the treasurer was instructed to take pledges from the floor. The sum of \$366 was pledged by individuals, county councils and clubs.

Finally it was decided to combine the supervision of the fund and this was done on July 30, 1929, when a resolution was passed by the Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs calling for a board of three members from the Federation and two members from the Home Agents Association to raise and administer the fund. The resolution was approved by the home agents at their meeting in January, 1930.

The entire fund is now in the hands of the State Federation

of Home Demonstration Clubs where it will be used by rural girls in preparing themselves for lives of usefulness to the State.

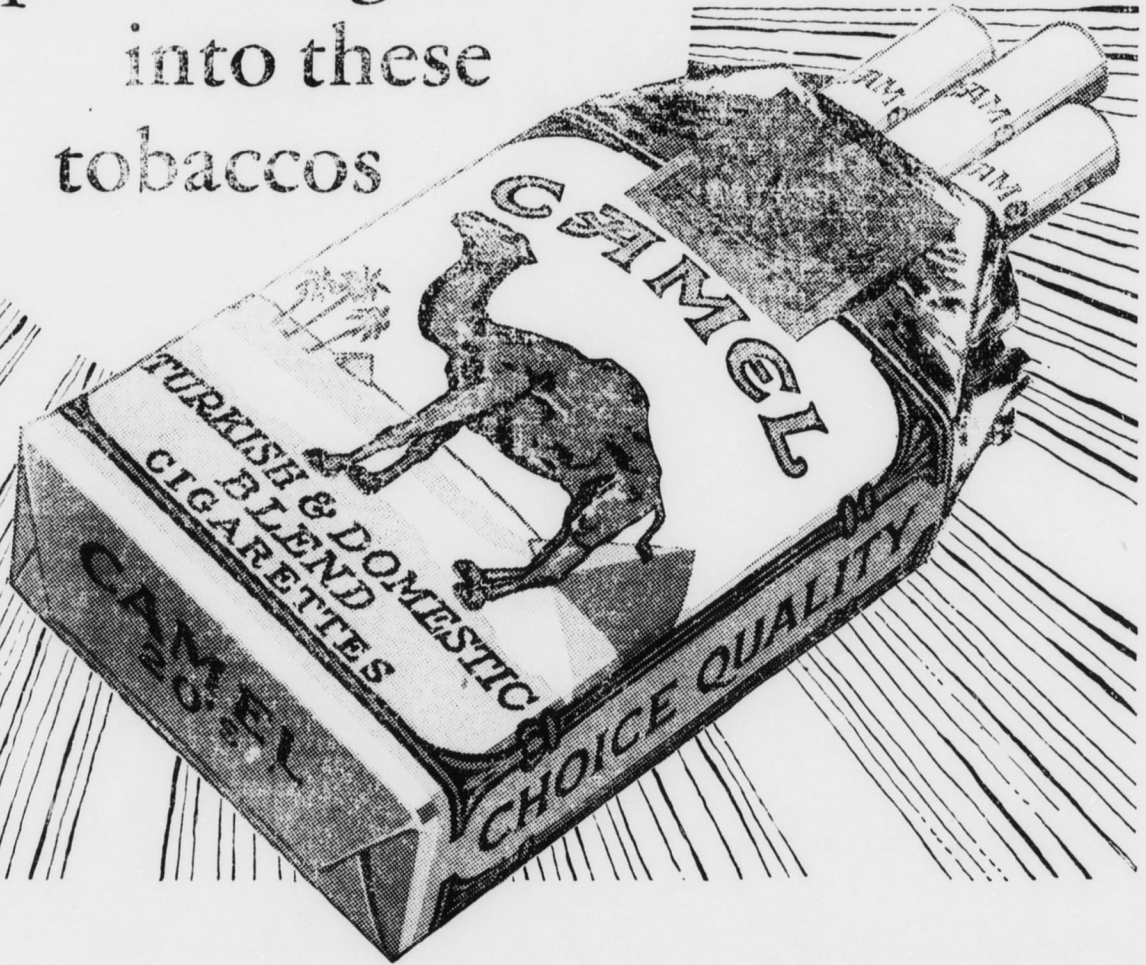
