I am sending to Mr. S. P. Christian the fee to enter the June Primary which is to be held June 7th for the purpose of expressing the wishes of the voters of N. C. I think this is a good law and since the enfranchising of the women I cannot see any other or better way to decide who shall be the candidates, as they do not attend the conventions.

And now just a word in regard to an old custom when it suited to "alternate." Our honored friend, R. L. Haymore, represented us two terms in succession—1915 to 1919—and this courtesy has never been returned by Surry, and if we were making the claim I think it's about time to pay the bill, but we are not, since the law has been changed to such a degree that everyone is entitled to vote and may select their choice. And anyone who believes he is competent to do the office has a right to enter the primary, except whether he is from the waters of Fish River or those of the Dan, so long as he is a citizen of the 2nd Senatorial district.

Sixty days is a short time in two years to learn what and how to do, and learn what our poor and neglected farmers need and I think it's my duty to make an effort at least to return to the job I had and finish one bill especially that I had recommended but didn't have time to complete, and that is this infamous law that compels the Sheriff to advertise on the first day of May every poor fellow land not fortunate enough to pay his taxes (in a newspaper) when the same end could be obtained by placing the same in the Register's office for 50c. instead of \$1.50.

This publishing to the world would save our humiliation if our homes are to be sold, and

our chance of a place to live would be in the game preserve with the coons and 'posums.

The United States makes it a crime to send a man a statement on a post card of his account and the State of North Carolina holds him up in a newspaper and charges him one dollar and fifty cents for the same.

Yes, I am a candidate for the Senate, to be selected June 7th on the Republican ticket.

A Sermonette.

(Rev. D. W. Allen.)

"Now ye are the body of Christ and members in particular."—1 Cor. 12:27.

The unity of Christians is a vital unity. "By one spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jew or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been made to drink into one spirit." The members of the body of Christ form one whole because they partake of one common life. As the life of the human body maintains all the various members and nourishes them to a well proportioned and harmonious growth, so is it in the body of Christ. The same spirit that exists in all Christians, derived from the same source, applying them with divine energy, and prompting them to the same habits and aims, when people accept the spirit of Christ they are formed into one body. It is a body where men forget personal gain and work for the promotion of one common cause. Here there is no clash between the interest of the individual and the interest of the society to which he belongs. Everyone who is drawn into the fellowships of the body of Christ has something to give to its good, and the work it does. He is in

connection with that body because the spirit of Christ has possessed him. This does not destroy his individuality. Every member of the church is different from every other member, and has a gift of his own to give. He may not see that anything the church is engaged in at present is work he can do. He may feel awkward and out of place when he tries to do what others are doing. But this is only a hint that he is intended for other work. "If they were all one member where were the body." If the whole body were an eye, where were the hearing? If the whole body were hearing, where were the smell? It is the church's task to elicit and use every faculty which its members possess. Don't let the fact that you are different from the other members of your church have you to suppose you do not belong to Christ's body. The ear is different from the eye; it can detect neither form nor color; it cannot enjoy a landscape or welcome a friend, but if the ear shall say, "Because I am not the eye I am not the body, it is therefore not of the body?" Is it not, on the contrary, its very diversity from the eye that makes it a welcome addition to the body. Its presence enriches and enlarges the usefulness of the

body. It is not by comparing ourselves with other people that we can tell whether we belong to the body of Christ. The church, if she would be perfect must embrace the most diversely gifted individuals, and allow the tastes, instincts, and aptitudes of all to be used in her work. There should be no depreciation of other people in the church. "The eye cannot say unto the hand, 'I have no need of thee,' nor again, the head to the feet, 'I have no need of thee.'" Contempt for any member of the body of Christ is most unseemly and sinful. Yet some seem unable to learn how many members and how various. It takes to complete a body, and especially how necessary are those functions they are unable to do. Love is the ligament which binds together the many members of the body of Christ. Without love there can be no body. And remember, a disconnected member is a useless member.

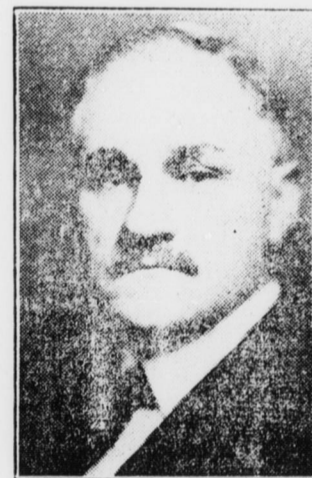

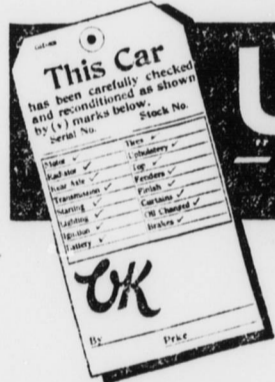
