

**Pellagra Deaths In August**

During August ninety-three deaths from pellagra were recorded in North Carolina. This number compares with ninety-one for the corresponding month last year. From January to Aug. inclusive this year exactly 700 people died as a result of pellagra. This number compares again with 648 during the same eight-month period last year.

It begins to look as if the intense efforts made throughout the State this year to enlighten the people concerning methods of prevention will not be without results. There has been much unemployment this year. Bank and business failures, low prices and general depression have upset the normal living routine for a large number of families. The problem of obtaining adequate food in sufficient quantity has been a real one for such people. Pellagra being a disease based on nutritional "imbalance" with peculiar nervous symptoms, conditions throughout the year have been very favorable to an increase in its occurrence. Good food, a hopeful outlook, and freedom from worry insofar as possible, afford the best protection against pellagra.
