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THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

President Hoover Calls Upon People To Observe Thanksgiving By Extending Aid To Those Who Are Suffering And In Need.

President Hoover has called upon the people of the United States to observe Thanksgiving day by extending aid to those who are in need and suffering closed from causes beyond their control. In his annual Thanksgiving proclamation, the chief exmany causes for Thanksgiving have suffered less than other from Raleigh. peoples from the present difficulties."

His proclamation follows:

United States, a proclamation: "Notwithstanding that our forefathers endured the hardships and privations of a primmeagre comforts, they nevertheless bequeathed to us a custom of devoting one day in evsanctuary of home and the joys King. that pervade it, and for the mercies of his protection from accident, sickness or death.

"Our country has many causes for Thanksgiving. We have been blest with distinctive evidence of divine As a nation we have suffered far less than other peoples from the present world difficulties. We have been free from civil and industrial discord. The outlook for peace among the nations has been strengthened. In a large measure we have made progress upon the enduring structure of our institutions. .. The arts and sciences that enrich our lives and enlarge our control of nature have made notable advances. Education has been further extended. We have made gains in the prevention of disease and in the protection of childhood.

"Now, therefore, I, Herbert Hoover, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, November 27, 1930, as a national day of Thanksginving, and do enjoin the people of the United States so to observe it, calling upon them to remember that many of our people are in need and suffering from causes beyond their control, and suggesting that a proper celebration of the day should include that we make sure that every person in the community, young and old, shall have cause to give thanks for our institutions and for the neighborly sentiments of our people.

"In witness wheof, I have hreeunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the seal of the United States."

Mr. Mitchell explained that in liquidating the affairs of the bank it would be necessary to place all the cash remaining in the vault of the Stokes county bank on deposit with some other institution, and made a special request that officials of the Wachovia Bank & Trust Co. send representatives to Walnut Cove, transfer the money to Winston-Salem and place it on deposit to the credit of John Mitchell, chief State bank examiner, with instructions that it be subject to his check only. Acting upon this request, the Wachovia bank sent two of its representatives to Walnut Cove where it received the money from the hands of Mr. Taylor, State bank examiner, in charge of the affairs of the Stokes county bank. The money was then placed on deposit with the Wachovia Bank & Trust Co, to the credit of John Mitchell, chief State bank examiner, and is subject only to his check The transaction is one which is merely a routine in detail in connection with the liquidation of any bank, and the sole motive of the Wachovia Bank & Trust Co was to perform a service requested by Mr. Mitchell and thereby render what assistance it could in helping to conserve the assets of the Stokes County Bank."
