

**MORE FUNDS BADLY NEEDED**

**Guilford Battle Ground, Near Greensboro, Could Be Made Beauty Spot—Mr. Mendenhall, Custodian, Here Today.**

The Federal government is powerfully stingy in its appropriations to Guilford Battle Grounds near Greensboro, which has been made a national park.

The annual appropriation for the up-keep of their part is only a little over \$8,000 per year, and is not enough to make any improvements.

Mr. W. H. Mendenhall, the custodian of this national park, was a visitor here today. He feels like Congress is going to make an appropriation for the improvement of the park during the next session of Congress.

Recently Mr. Mendenhall has planted quite a lot of shrubbery on the 125 acre plat, but it takes considerable money to make a showing on such a large tract.

**NEW FORD EIGHTS OUT**

**Seventy Thousand Men Expected to Produce 4,000 to 5,000 Daily — 1,500,000 Cars in 1932.**

Detroit Mich., March 9.—The first Ford V-8 rolled off the assembly line at the River Rouge plant today, it was reported automatically, as Henry Ford started mass production of his latest venture in the field of transportation.

Ford, it was reported, personally stamped the number "1" on the engine of the new series. The simple christening ceremony was attended by Edsel Ford, Charles E. Sorenson and a group of workmen.

With 70,000 men employed, the 69-year-old manufacturer is prepared to produce between 4,000 and 5,000 cars daily. Ford anticipates heavy production and 100,000 men at work by June 1. He plans to manufacture 1,500,000 cars during 1932.

**EAST HARD HIT BY STORMS**

**Many Are Homeless Along North Carolina Coast—Nine Houses Swept Away At One Point.**

Manteo, March 9.—Snow added today to the suffering of those who lost their homes in the storm on the Carolina banks Sunday. The flakes fell rapidly over this section this morning.

Conditions at Avon and Rodanthe were believed grave because of the shortage of food, fuel and other supplies.

Bernice Ballance of the Hatteras Coast Guard reported Hatteras, Buxton and Frisco were safe and suffered comparatively small loss of property from the storm except in fishing equipment and boats.

He said nine houses went out with the tide at Kennekeet.
