the County Commissioners All persons who are liable for a poll tax who fail to give themselves in, and who own property and fail to list it, will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, fined or imprisoned.

Dogs must be listed-the State law requires every dog to be listed. Persons failing or refusing to list dogs are guilty of a misdemeanor

and may be fined \$50 or imprisoned 30 days. Section 402 specifies that the owner of the home (or lessee of such owner) shall be responsible for listing of any dog belonging t

any members of his family, and for any dog found on his place. Dogs must be listed this year. All persons failing to list before

the list 'taker and listing before Board of County Commissioners, will be charged a fee of twenty-five cents.

Failure to list or attempt to evad just taxation will subject taxpayer to a specific penalty of 25 per cent. of all total tax and to such other

penalties as prescribed by law. HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS.


