NEW BRIDGE FOR BUCK ISLAND

TO BE ERECTED ON HIGHWAY LEADING OUT OF DANBURY TO MT. AIRY AND STUART, VA.

Contract for a concrete bridge across Dan river, on the Mt. Airy-Stuart, Va., highway, 3 miles north of Danbury, will be awarded in the near future. It was stated that in the building of the bridge referred to as well as to all the work soon to be let, that the men employed would be allowed to work only 30 hours per week. This is in accordance with the requirements of the relief bill under which the money is appropriated by the federal government.
