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## SIDELIGHTS ON THE LATE ELECTION

### INTERESTING ANALYSIS OF THE VOTE IN STOKES COUNTY, AS COMPARED WITH TWO YEARS AGO.

Some very interesting facts to Stokes politicians may be gathered from a close analysis of the late election figures in the county. For instance in 1930, 5,383 votes were cast, while in 1932, 6,463 persons registered their ballots, again of 1,080 over two years ago.

Of the gain in total vote over two years ago—taking the congressional vote as a fair average—the Democrats furnished 776 new suffragists, and the Republicans 342.

East Sandy Ridge is the banner Democratic precinct of the county, with a majority of 245 for Roosevelt. Snow Creek is the banner Democratic Township, yielding a majority of 357.

The banner Republican precinct is now Flinty Knoll, with 94 majority. Quaker Gap retains its lead as the strongest Republican township, with 166 majority.

In the late election the Democrats carried 14 precincts, while the Republicans won in 7, as follows:

The highest vote any candidate received at any precinct, was 315 for Phillips at East Walnut Cove. The lowest vote any Democrat received at any precinct was 36 for Joyce at Mizpah.

The highest vote any Republican candidate received at any one precinct was 291 for Jacob Fulton at East Walnut Cove. The lowest Republican vote at any one precinct was 35 for Fagg at Freeman's.

Roosevelt's vote of 3728 was the highest total vote of the county, with Taylor's 3710 being second. Roosevelt's majority was 1150, while Taylor's was 661. The big difference was caused by Republicans scratching Hoover.

## DRIVER'S LICENSE LAW TO PASS

### NEXT LEGISLATURE WILL PROBABLY TAKE COGNIZANCE OF TERRIBLE TOLL OF DEATH ON THE HIGHWAYS.

Sentiment appears to be growing in North Carolina for the enactment of a uniform driver's license law. Captain Charles D. Farmer, of the State highway patrol, announced in Winston-Salem yesterday while on a visit to the offices of Lieutenant T. A. Early, director of division C.

Six serious accidents occurred in the city of Raleigh within the past few days and every one of them happened as a direct result of carelessness on the part of the drivers involved. Captain Farmer stated in calling attention to the need for a better system of controlling the reckless driver.

A bill will doubtless be introduced during the 1933 session of the General Assembly providing for a statewide driver's license law. Captain Farmer stated.

As per custom of the past few years since its organization, the patrol will assist in the sale of automobile licenses at the various bureaus scattered over the State. Captain Farmer announced. At least one patrol officer will be assigned to each station for protection purposes, and to render any other assistance necessary.

The patrol head is working on a state-wide co-operation plan which will tend to effect a closer degree of co-operation among all law enforcement agencies in the prevention and detection of crime and make their work more effective. He says that the patrol and its work is not properly understood by many people and that he often receives anonymous letters of criticism. On the other hand there are thousands who appreciate the value of the patrol's activities and when they are negligent and violate the law, many people respond promptly and courteously to warnings, he states.

## IMPROVING THE SCHOOL GROUNDS

### MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED MEN WORKING AT THE EXPENSE OF FEDERAL R. F. C. FUNDS—PRETTY EXAMPLE OF KING LADIES.

The Reporter is advised by Superintendent of Schools J. C. Carson that more than 100 men are at work on the various school grounds of the county, improving and beautifying them. These workers are paid out of funds provided by the Federal government through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation as an aid to employment. It will be recalled that sometime since North Carolina's allotment of this money was secured by application of Gov. Gardner and the State authorities. Our board of county commissioners asked for \$25,000 for Stokes, which allocation was duly made by the Federal and State authorities. This money cannot be used directly for charity, or for buildings, fixtures, etc., but can be paid out for labor. The county school authorities took advantage of the opportunity to secure valuable work in the interests of education, at the same time respecting the letter of the law as to the application of the money.

Prof. Carson calls attention to the pretty example of the ladies of King, through their Woman's club, who have placed shrubbery around the King school building at the expense of the club.

## TOBACCO MARKET CLOSES WEDNESDAY

### THANKSGIVING TO BE OBSERVED BY THE BUYERS AND WAREHOUSEMEN WHO HAVE HANDED ABOUT 25,000,000 POUNDS—AVERAGE ABOUT THE SAME.
