Lespedeza Seed Here This Week

Lespedeza seed will be available to Stokes farmers at Danbury this week. The Inland Seed Growers' Association is to send a ton down as a starter. These are of the Royal variety. Most of the seed to be delivered here this week are guaranteed to be free from shelling. Others show a trace of shelling and for that reason will come at a lower price. Certified seed of any variety at a reasonable price are scarce.

The supply of lespedeza seed of all varieties in North Carolina is said to be a bit short on account of an unfavorable season last fall in the Piedmont section of the state where most of the seed for sale normally are produced. Prospective growers are urged to purchase their seed for planting this year as early as practical and from any source at which seed of desired quality and varieties can be had at a fair price. The probability is that seed of the Common and Kobe varieties will be available at a later date though there is at the present no definite assurance of this. Growers are urged to buy seed now.

Stokes Signed Tobacco Acreage And Production a Bit High

The contracted acreage and production in Stokes is slightly above the figures announced for this area by the Internal Revenue Department. However, the Stokes figures are not so far out of line as those of the average county in the state. As announced before and during the sign-up campaign growers who gave substantiating evidence to support their records will receive no cut in bringing the total figures into line with government figures. But it will be necessary to adjust our figures before our contracts will be accepted. The committee will consider this matter soon and determine the method to use for adjusting the figures. There is no reason for alarm regarding this adjustment to be made, for, as stated above, the figures for Stokes are not far off.

Flu-Cured Tobacco Growers Ask Protection

Representatives of the Advisory Committee of the North Carolina Flu-Cured Tobacco Growers' Association are asking for protection against increased production by consigners of the contract. The indications are that on all tobacco produced in the flu-cured belt by growers not signing an acreage adjustment contract will be required to pay a tax of 30 per cent. of the gross sales for the privilege of marketing their crop. This plan seems to have the backing of an overwhelmingly majority of the growers. Fortunately nearly all of the growers in Stokes have signed contracts and will be exempted from paying this tax.

Burley Growers in Stokes Should Sign Burley Contracts

Warehouse records in the Burley belt show that several Stokes farmers produced Burley tobacco. Local Burley tobacco growers are eligible to sign a Burley tobacco contract. Any local grower of Burley type tobacco who has signed the contract offered to growers of the flu-cured type, giving his acreage and production of Burley tobacco, may get in touch with the county agent and have the crop measured now and hereafter. It is important that these growers recognize that they will not be permitted to market Burley tobacco with sales cards issued to the growers of the flu-cured type. Too, signing Burley type as flu-cured tobacco reduces the allotment of flu-cured tobacco for Stokes county. The county agent will be glad to confer with any local grower of Burley tobacco. Any errors made in this line can be corrected now.

Production Credits

Farmers wishing to secure production credit, money with which to purchase fertilizer, seeds and other materials incidental to running their farms during the coming season may file their applications for loans through the office of the county agent. The loans for Stokes farmers will come through the Winston-Salem Production Credit Association. Applications should be filed at the local office. It is important that these be filed at some time prior to the date at which the money will be needed with which to finance farm operations.
