The Cherry Month

OFS anyone exist who doesn't like the tart .weetness, the anione taste of cherries s most buildfull of fuller ent cherries this month in We can cherries this month in-memory of George Washington, but the memories that remain to-us from eating them simply make as want to cat more. You can eat delicious cherries out of cans all through the year, or, if you pre-fer, you can put them up as pre-serves. Try the following recipes for this number. for this purpose.

Choice Cherry Recipes

Cherry Preserves: Boil rapidly the contents of a No. 10 can of red pitted cherries and two cups of sugar, until the mixture drops thickly from a spoon, or to 218 degrees. Stir with wooden spoon to prevent burning. Pour intended in the process or jurs, and sea This makes about three quarts.

Red Paspberry and Cherry Preserves. Slightly crush the reuplited cherries from a No. 19 can, and add the contents of a No. can, and add the contents of a No 10 can of rasporries. Boil the fruit and three and a half cups of sugar rapidly until it drops thickly from a spoon, or to 218 degrees. Stir with a wooden spoon to prevent burning. Pour into hot glasses or jars, and seal. This makes about six quarts.

This makes about six quarts.

Cheery and Pineapple Proserve. These require a No. 12 can of red pitted cherries, a No. 3 can of crushed pineapple and two cups of sugar, and are madine exactly the same manner at the recipe above. This recipmakes six quarts.*


