

Two Men Are Hurt In Wreck While Rushing to Another

O. J. Boles, Pinnacle, automobile dealer, and Casey Jones, salesman, were injured Tuesday morning when their car struck a telephone pole south of Pinnacle while the two were on their way to King to investigate another accident in which Boles' wife had been involved a few minutes before. Jones, who was understood to have been hurt seriously, was taken to a Winston-Salem hospital.

Mrs. Boles' car overturned just north of King, it was understood, and when Boles received news of the accident he and Jones started to the place. Their car struck the telephone pole just outside the village. Mrs. Boles was not seriously injured in the other wreck.

Brummitt Very Ill

Dennis G. Brummitt, attorney general of North Carolina, is in a "critical condition" at his home at Raleigh.

Pneumonia has developed following the severe attack of influenza with which Mr. Brummitt was stricken last week.

BOOKLET ON FARM CREDIT

A booklet has been published by the Agricultural Commission, American Bankers Association, on "Factors Affecting Farm Credit." For the purpose of furthering on a national scale the taking of farm inventories and the making of credit statements as sponsored by the commission in cooperation with the state colleges of agriculture and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The goal is better relationships between farmers and their banks.

The booklet is devoted to the types of loans generally required by farmers, the need for farm credit, how it can be obtained, when it is safe to borrow, what principles to follow to establish credit in advance of needs, and how both the lender and borrower are interested in sound, productive farm credit.
