The following account of the accidental death of Hugh Dallis Fallin is taken from the Madison

The unfortunate man was a son of the late Wm. L. Fallin, of Stokes county, near Prestonville.

The account follows:

Hugh Dallas Fallin, a highly respected merchant of Madison over a number of years, succum-
