

STATE CONVENTION DELEGATES NAMED

COUNTY CONVENTION REAFFIRMS ITS ALLEGIANCE TO "SENATOR AGREEMENT" WITH SURRY — ELECTION OF COUNTY CHAIRMAN DEFERRED OWING TO LACK OF QUORUM.

The Stokes Democrats in regular convention assembled Saturday elected delegates to Raleigh State convention, and reaffirmed its allegiance to the "Senator Agreement" with Surry. The matter of the election of a permanent county chairman was deferred until a later meeting on account of the lack of a quorum. There are 21 precincts, and it was found that a number of these had not regularly organized on the Saturday preceding the county convention as the State plan of organization directs. The law requires that a committee of five, one of whom shall be a woman, must meet at each precinct on the Saturday preceding the convention day, and organize by naming one of their number precinct chairman. The latter automatically becomes a member of the county executive committee to serve two years.

On motion of S. G. Sparger, every Democrat attending State convention from Stokes county, whether present at this convention or not, was authorized to be seated as a delegate and allowed to vote.

The matter of the agreement between Stokes and Surry as to alternating the senatorship coming up, the following resolution was introduced by C. E. Davis, and seconded by J. L. Christian, McDonald supporter; S. P. Christian, Hoey supporter, and C. E. Davis, Graham supporter. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

RESOLUTION:
WHEREAS, for a long period of time, there has been an agreement between the Democratic Executive Committees of Stokes and Surry counties, composing the 23rd Senatorial District of North Carolina, that the Senator to which the District is entitled, should be rotated and under said agreement Stokes County has always nominated the Senator the year the President of the United States is nominated and elected

and Surry County has always nominated the Senator in the off year: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Democratic Executive Committee of Stokes County, North Carolina, meeting in regular session at the Courthouse in Danbury on the 16th day of May, 1936, at the hour of 11 o'clock A. M. that they re-affirm their allegiance to said agreement and pledge their support to the candidate nominated by the Democratic party in the county entitled to the Senator under the rotating agreement heretofore existing between the Executive Committees of the two counties composing the 23rd Senatorial District.

Be it further resolved: That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Surry County and to the Chairman of the Board of Elections of Stokes and Surry Counties.

The above resolution unanimously passed by the Democratic Executive Committee of Stokes County, all members voting in the affirmative and none in the negative.

Winston-Salem, May 19. — Legality of political precedent which bars Fred A. Kirkman, of Mount Airy, from seeking the Democratic nomination for the state senate from the 23rd district, will be tested before the attorney general, Kirkman said last night.

The Mount Airy man said L. P. McLendon, chairman of the state board of elections, refused to reverse the ruling which made him ineligible to enter the primary.

McLendon, Kirkman said, upheld a ruling made earlier than the 23rd district's agreement for alternation of candidates between Stokes and Surry counties was filed with the board of election. Kirkman will contest the ruling, he said, before Attorney General A. A. F. Seawell.
