## SUDDEN DEATH OF S. J. KIRBY

COUNTY AGENT OF STOKES PASSES AT HOME IN WALNUT COVE EARLY MONDAY — FUNERAL AT HOME, BURIAL AT SELMA.

Samuel Jones Kirby, 49, Stokes county agent for the past three years and one of the best-known men in this section of the state died suddenly Monday morning at 7:45 o'clock at his home in Walnut Cove.

A native of Selma, Mr. Kirby had been connected with the North Carolina State College extension service since 1918. He was stationed at N. C. State College until five years ago when he went to Spruce Pines as county agent for Mitchell county, where he remained for two years. He came here three years ago as Stokes county agent.

Mr. Kirby had made numerous friends both in this and adjoining counties since he came here. He was a member of the Walnut Cove Baptist Church and the local council of the Jr. O. U. A. M.

Survivors are his widow; four children, Mel Jones Kirby, Jr., Mary, Charles and Annie Kirby, all of Walnut Cove, and several brothers and sisters.

The funeral was held at the home Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. The pastor of the Baptist Church conducted the services. Burial was at Selma at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Kirby had a wide acquaintance in Stokes, where he served the farmers with energy and ability.

No information as to his successor in the county demonstration work has yet been announced.

It is learned that the offices here will remain open under the charge of T. H. Sears, assistant county agent.
