HE HAD LIVED IN YADKIN COUNTY — T. G. NEW'S FINE RECORD AT SUNDAY SCHOOL — SERIOUS ACCIDENT HAPPENS TO OSCAR SPAINHOWER — OTHER NEWS OF KING.

King, Jan. 27 — Reuben Gunter, aged 59, died Monday at his home in Courtney, Yadkin county following a short illness from pneumonia. The deceased who was reared near here is survived by the widow and several children. Two brothers, Coon Gunter, of Madison and P. W. Gunter of King survive, also two sisters, they are, Mrs. Richard Watts, of Mount Airy and Mrs. Bill Hill, of Germanton. Funeral and interment was at Courtney Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock.
