## GRAND JURY MAKES REPORT

COUNTY HOME AND PRISON CAMP, COUNTY JAIL AND COURT HOUSE OFFICES, ALL FOUND IN GOOD SHAPE — FORTY-FOUR CASES PRESENTED FOR TRUE BILLS.

The grand jury serving for the late term of Superior court, with Roy Redding of Germantown as foreman, reported to Judge Phillips as follows: State of North Carolina, Stokes County.

In the Superior Court August Term 1937, To Honorable F. D. Phillips, Judge Presiding:

The grand jury for the August term, 1937, of the Superior Court of Stokes county, most respectfully reports to the Court that they have acted on all the bills of indictment which have been sent before them except for 12 in which there was a lack of witnesses, and have made presentments of all matters of criminal nature that are within their knowledge, there being 4 presentments.

Committee appointed to inspect the county home reports to this body that they find the home in good condition. They recommend that the county welfare officer visit the home at least once a month. They also recommend that 25 or 30 shade trees be planted on the ground of the home.

Committee appointed to inspect the prison camp reports to this body that they found same in good condition and that they find the inmates treated well and cared for.

Committee appointed to inspect the county jail report to this body that they find it in good condition and the prisoners well cared for, but recommend that the county welfare officer visit the jail at least once a week.

Committee appointed to inspect the offices in the court house report that they found all offices well kept and in good condition.

The grand jury for the August term 1937, hereby reports that they found true bills in 44 cases presented before them. And, that 3 other cases presented to their body were pronounced Not True Bills.
