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SOMEBODY TELL W. R. BOLES AGE

HE LIVED NEAR DALTON, STOKES COUNTY, IN 1869— HE RECITES SOME OF HIS SCHOOLMATES.

To Whom This May Concern:
I take this method to try to find out my correct age. I thought perhaps I could find out through free school or Sunday School records where I attended when I was quite young. I was born in Stokes county near Dalton about 1869 or 1870; I attended Sunday School at Trinity near King about the time Mr. Rufus Dalton was Poted Spruff of Stokes county, and I went to free school at the old Hauser school house three or four miles south of Dalton's Mill. Miss Laura Hunt was teacher, also Mr. Calvin Newsum was teacher. I was staying with Mr. Leonard Moser near Dalton's Mill; his son, Jim Moser, was living at Dalton's Mill. My mother was Sallie Boles; I never knew my father's name. She worked in some tobacco factory—Dalton or Greene — can't remember which. I thought perhaps someone would read this that could remember me and could give me some information. I did not know whether they kept old school records or not. Mother died when I was small and I have no record of my age.
