Flood Damage In Stokes Will Reach Quarter Million

Corn and Hay Crops, Roads and Bridges Suffer Great Damage—Dan River Highest For Forty Years—Town Fork, Little Yadkin, Big Creek and All Streams On Rampage.

It is conservatively estimated that this week's flood wrought \$250,000 damage to Stokes crops, roads and bridges.

Many thousand bushels of corn were either swept away or submerged on Dan river, Town Fork, Little Yadkin, Big Creek, Snow Creek and other streams of the county.

In the western part of the county, especially in the Westfield and Francisco sections, several small bridges were washed out.

The highways were badly scourged by the storm, and many of the secondary roads will have to be repaired before school

buses can navigate them.

Dan river was the highest it has reached in 40 years. Many fine bottoms of corn and hay were completely ruined. The Riverside baseball park at Danbury was completely submerged. Raging waters raced across it, taking off half or two-thirds of the surrounding fence.

The river was several feet above Clemmon's ford bridge on Tuesday afternoon, being unable to cross, or even approach the bridge at 100 feet distance.

At Duck Island and Danbury the stream barely touched the floors of the bridges.
