## THE NEW 7-ISLAND ROAD

**CHANGES MADE IN THE ORIGINAL ROUTE PLANNED — WORK IS PROGRESSING RAPIDLY ON THE PROJECT.**

The route of the new Seven Island road now being constructed by W. P. A. and the State highway commission, has been changed from the first plans. The road instead of beginning near the Old Inn and the Danbury Reporter office — which was the route first considered — will start at a point near the Baptist church in the west end of Danbury on highway No. 89, and will follow practically the old road leading to Seven Island bridge, but grades are being cut down and curves eliminated.

After crossing the Seven Island bridge the route will lead to the right instead of the left, and will traverse that section of Peter's Creek township near the Robert Mabe old place and Noel Oakley's and Reely Stevens'. It will intersect with the Hartman-Jewell road near where the present road leads out.

Reid Jones is the superintendent of this project. Some very modern road building machinery is being used, while about 40 hands are engaged. The work is proceeding rapidly, and the forces should reach the bridge in a few days.

## Filling Station Robbed Wilkes Boys In Jail

The Gulf Service Station at Walnut Cove, operated by John Lowellyn, was recently robbed, and Julian and David Wilkes are in jail here charged with the robbery. At a hearing before Magistrate P. C. Campbell their bond was fixed at \$1,000, which they failed to give.

**ALL TOWNSHIPS OF THE COUNTY RESPONDED TO THE CALL FOR FUNDS — SEVERAL WENT OVER THE TOP**

J. Watt Tuttle will this week mail to W. T. Bost, of Greensboro, assistant manager for ex-Governor Ehringhaus, in the State campaign for relief for the Finns, check for \$85.04, representing contributions of the nine townships of the county for Finnish relief.

The money will pass through the hands of ex-Governor Ehringhaus, ex-President Herbert Hoover, and will then be sent direct to the Finns, who are desperately in need of help.
