Joe Fulp of Walnut Cove is Instantly Killed By His Truck

(Martinsville, Va.)
Joseph W. Fulp, 28, of Walnut Cove, was instantly killed here about noon Tuesday when his truck went over a 75-foot embankment following a collision with a truck from Roanoke, Va., on the highway.

Rudy Tatum, 13, of Walnut Cove, riding in the cab of the truck with Fulp, escaped injury when he was thrown clear of the machine after the collision.

The driver of the other truck, whose identity was not learned, also escaped injury.

Fulp, with Tatum as a passenger, left Walnut Cove about 9:30 o'clock with a load of veneer bound for Roanoke. He was operating a truck owned by the Walnut Cove Veneering Corporation.

Witnesses said Fulp's truck left the highway and rolled down the 75-foot embankment. Fulp was unable to escape from the cab and the veneer became loosened from the truck and buried the machine's cab. Fulp was crushed to death.

The accident occurred about two miles north of Rocky Mount. Surviving are the widow, the former Miss Opal Bell of Mayodan, his mother, Mrs. Grace Fulp of Walnut Cove, five sisters, Mrs. Jones Morgan and Mrs. L. O. Williams of Walnut Cove; Mrs. Howard Fulp and Mrs. Oscar Greer of Winston-Salem, and Mrs. R. G. Hampton of Germantown, Route 1; and two brothers, Ira Fulp of Walnut Cove and James Fulp of Walnut Cove, Route 1.

The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Fulp Moravian Church near Walnut Cove. Burial will be in the church graveyard.

Mrs. Ellis Ward, club president, presided over the business session. Members voted to hold the club picnic for members and their families on August 17 at the home of Mrs. Tesh.


Mrs. Tesh had charge of the social hour.
