

Hints For Motorists

WHEN replacing a bulb in a good idea to coat the base of the bulb with flake graphite. This will prevent the bulb from corroding and sticking in the socket. Also, if you wipe a little vaseline around the joint between the body of the headlight and the rim, it will help keep out water, and at the same time make it easier to remove the lens. lens.

If you have carburetor trouble that is not traceable to the usual sources, the main metering jet of the carburetor may be at fault. An enormous amount of gasoline passes through this little part in the course of a year and sometimes it breaks down under the load. In some cases it has been found cut clean off.
