

**FORTY-FIVE BOYS LEAVE FOR CAMP**

**ARMY NOW NUMBERS MORE THAN SEVEN MILLIONS, WITH TWO MILLIONS OVERSEAS—THE STATE OF WAR**

Leaving here Wednesday, 46 more of the flower of Stokes county's youth were transported to Camp Croft, South Carolina.

According to advises from Washington the army now numbers more than 7,000,000, and that 2,000,000 have been sent overseas.

Doubtless many boys joining the army will never see the battlefronts, but will be kept on duty inside the borders of the United States. It is an enormous job to transport a million men across the seas and take months.

In the meantime it is believed that Germany will ask for peace terms before the end of 1943. Many of the leading military authorities of America and England as well as neutral countries believe so.

Italy is practically out of the picture as an antagonist. Sicily is well nigh mopped up. Russia's great offensive continues to drive the Germans back. From the Pacific no less an authority than Gen. Douglas MacArthur says Japan is entirely on the defensive everywhere.

The production of the American

war plants is overwhelming. U. S. alone is making 8,000 planes a month, which is twice the output of all the Axis powers put together. The Allies have complete mastery of the air on all fronts.

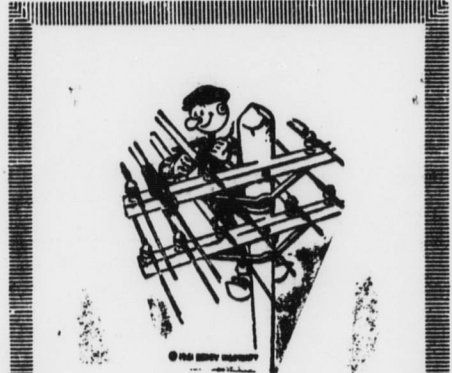
