MISS ANDERSON RESIGNS WELFARE POSITION HERE

MRS. HARRY WILLIAMSON, FORMER ROCKINGHAM WELFARE HEAD, REPORTED NAMED

Miss Christine Anderson, superintendent of the Stokes Welfare Department for the past year or so, has filed her resignation which will take effect in Nov. She plans to take a position in war work.

Mrs. Harry Williamson, of Pine Hall, who has headed the Rockingham county welfare department for the past several years, is reported named as the successor.

ELKIN FAT STOCK AND WOOL SHOW AND SALE

On October 14 and 15 there will be at Elkin a Fat Stock and Wool Show and Sale. Any producer or feeder in the counties of Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Caldwell, Davie, Forsyth, Iredell, Stokes, Surry, Watauga, Wilkes and Yadkin is eligible to exhibit.

Each exhibitor must have been the bona fide owner of: cattle entries for at least five months; hogs, at least two months before the show. A wool exhibitor must have been the owner of the sheep at the time the fleece was shorn.

Four-H and F. F. A. members must have personally fed and cared for the stock entered in their names for the major part of the time specified for ownership in paragraph 2.

All exhibits should be approved by the county agent of county in which the exhibitor resides before the application for entry is made. All exhibits entered in the show must be approved by the management at the show barn at the time of delivery.

All animals entered in this show must meet the State Live-

stock Sanitary Department Requirements for movement of animals inter and intra state for exhibition or immediate slaughter purposes. Exhibitors must submit evidence to the superintendent of the show that the animals have met the above requirements.

This is a great opportunity for Stokes county people to exhibit the fine hogs which we have, especially if you are planning to sell animals on foot. As everyone knows you are assured of the highest prices when an animal is put up at auction sale. Because of the extreme feed shortage, this is a good time to get rid of fat hogs that are not needed for home consumption.
