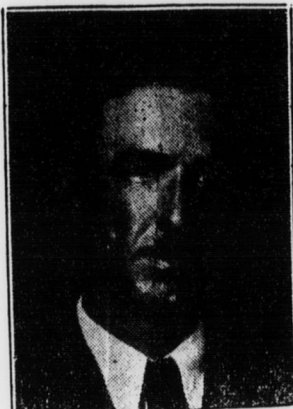

From the
County Agent

Nat Boles of the Meadows community brought into the County Agent's office two bean plants covered with well-filled pods of snap beans. These beans were planted after wheat. The soil had been limed about two years ago.

One noticeable thing about the bean crop was the complete lack of leaf and bean damage due to the beetle. Beetles do not last up to September and October. This should be an added reason for fall planting of beans.

Mr. Boles also reports that he has cucumbers, corn, turnips, turnip greens, and tomatoes in his truck patches for home use.

Last year Mr. Boles sold \$44.00 worth of turnip greens from one-tenth of an acre.

He made 50 bushels of Irish potatoes and 22 bushels of sweet potatoes.

This live-at-home practice and fall garden idea will go a long way in preserving the total value of our tobacco check.

SCRAP IRON DRIVE

Our government has called for scrap iron. All types of heavy iron is acceptable. We should accept the call, as we have all other patriotic calls, and make a careful survey of all metal available.

Old plow points, broken machinery of all kinds, old boilers, reapers, mowers, in fact any metal should be collected and placed on the road.

School children are urged to collect this scrap and take it to their school so that proper credit may be given each child and each school.

A special prize will be given the first school reporting 100 percent of children bringing scrap on any one day. The principal of each school is urged to report to

the County Agent's office the date that each child has turned in scrap iron.

Remember, the 100 percent activity must be on one day!

Suitable prizes will be awarded to each school on "pounds of scrap per pupil" basis. Thus small schools can compete with the larger schools.

The important thing is — WE NEED THE SCRAP IRON NOW!

TOP CALF COMES TO COUNTY

J. Harry Corns, Stuart, Va., Route 5, and B. B. Walker, Walnut Cove, purchased two animals at the Gurnsey sale at Elkin last Tuesday. These calves trace back to the well-known and outstanding Maxim breeding and blood lines.

Mr. Corns purchased the bull calf, Grassy Grove Yeoman's Max, bred and consigned by M. F. Shore, Clyde, N. C. This calf traces 4 times to High Point Prince Maxim, once to Valor's Yeoman, and once to Burnside Ultra King. His five tested dams averaged 14,307.9 pounds of milk and 783.3 pounds of fat and all were tested in immature classes.

Mr. Walker bought a heifer bred and consigned by H. W. Naub, East Bend, N. C.

This heifer, of Rocky Reach breeding, will begin the building up of the Walker purebred Guernsey herd. Mr. Walker now has a bull of Klondike, Arden, and other Maxim breeding. One of her tested dams produced 11,575 pounds of milk and 554 pounds of fat in Class D.

With animals like these and like other animals that have come to the county lately we can expect to breed cattle equal to that found anywhere. Farmers in the county now have some outstanding bulls from prominent herds that are breeding good calves which will help our dairy and milk industry.
