A meeting will be at the following places for the purpose of having all tobacco producers sign their 1943 application for APC Payment.

Danbury township—Courthouse October 23.

Big Creek township—Francisco School October 25.

Meadows township — Ross Store October 27.

Quaker Gap township—Reynolds School October 28.

Snow Creek township— Sandy Ridge School November 2.

Yadkin township — Pinnacle School November 3.

Yadkin township—King School November 4.

Peter's Creek township— Lawsonville School November 5.

Sauratown township—(Will be notified later of date.)

Only one meeting will be held in a township and the office is scheduling only one meeting to get all applications signed. No applications will be mailed out of the office this year, therefore, if you do not want to make a trip to Danbury, please come to this meeting.

All producers on the same farm are requested to come together. This notice is only being sent to landlords so it will be the duty of the landlord to get his tenants together and bring them with him to the meeting.

Late practices will also be checked at this meeting, such as lespedeza, rye left, limestone, and phosphate used. If you have any limestone or phosphate that has not been spread please spread this material at once. The sooner you get this material spread the sooner your application can be transmitted to the State Office and the sooner your check will come.
