Food store, one of the larger purchasers of Tarheel eggs, show this company bought 823,640 dozen eggs in the State last year topping their 1942 purchases by nearly 40 percent and paying N. C. producers \$153,057 more than during the previous year.

Even greater cooperation by distributors and consumers is needed now, the poultry office said, to assure farmers a profitable market for their surplus production during the next few weeks and thus insure that a feast will not be followed by a famine. "Each of us can help," he concluded, "by eating more eggs during this period. Remember, there is a 'whole' food, complete with proteins, essential vitamins, fats and minerals."

about the AAA and other EXTENSION WORK From the County Agent

Stokes County declared war on rats May 23 and 24. The preparation was carefully made. The organization on every front was completed before the fatal day for the rats.

High school principals, the Danbury Woman's Club, the Stokes County Rationing Board, the Neighborhood Leaders, and the Vocational Department had a lion's share of the burden of signing up approximately 600 farmers.

Two-hundred pounds of fish, 120 pounds of corn meal, 35 pounds of rolled oats, 100 pounds of red squill, and a number of minor elements were cooked by the skilled hands of Reid George-blended to the correct potency for a sure kill by Mr. Whitehead. Packaging was done by Miss Lura Boone and assistants, and distributed to community centers by the County Agent's forces; Deputy Sheriff Carl Ray, Game Protector Carl Ray Flinchum, R. M. Green, principal Walnut Cove school; vocational Teachers Brandon and Johnson; Conservationists Metz and Ayers; Labor Assistant, Maxwell Alley, Farm Security office, Miss Dooe and Supt. of State Prison Camp Reid George.

Farmers met at their school on May 23 at 3:00 p. m. A demonstration for putting out the bait was conducted by the party who delivered the bait. This party had been instructed by Mr. Whitehead of the Rodent Control Division U. S. D. I., Raleigh, prior to the delivery trip.

Survey cards were enclosed with the bait. At this writing all the cards have not been sent in, but reports indicate a very effective offense was launched that netted many casualties on the rat hoards.

Over 50 known dead rats were reported in five cases.

Several reported 40 to 50 with an ever increasing number as the number dropped to 20 and below. It is estimated that each rat

on a farm eats and destroys \$2.00 worth of feed and food per year. If 3000 rats were killed the people, on an average, saved \$10.00 for each \$1.00 invested. This does not make allowance for the female rats which might produce a litter of rats each month.

Stokes county can be rat free. The cooperative spirit exemplified by all concerned is the first step in achieving this very desirable goal.

SOYBEANS FOR HAY

The increased number of dairy cattle in Stokes county necessarily calls for an increased amount of hay crops. The lespedeza crop is sown but we still have plenty of time for the seeding of cowpeas, soybeans and sudan grass. Many people are finding that it pays to add sudan grass to the soybeans. It is recommended that you seed three pecks of the small soybeans and around 20 pounds of sudan grass to the acre for maximum amount of hay per acre. If the sudan grass is not used, seed one bushel of the small soybeans. When the large beans are used for hay seed two bushels per acre.

Fire At Walnut Cove

The residence on the B. B. Walker plantation at or near Walnut Cove was burned this week. The cause of the fire was not determined.
