SOYBEANS FOR HAY


The increased number of dairy cattle in Stokes county necessarily calls for an increased amount of hay crops. The lespedeza crop is sown but we still have plenty of time for the seeding of cowpeas, soybeans and sudan grass. Many people are finding that it pays to add sudan grass to the soybeans. It is recommended that you seed three pecks of the small soybeans and around 20 pounds of sudan grass to the acre for maximum amount of hay per acre. If the sudan grass is not used, seed one bushel of the small soybeans. When the large beans are used for hay seed two bushels per
