# Hanging Rock State Park Officially Opens July 4th

Popular Resort Will Be Officially Available to the Public Next Tuesday—Life Guards Will Be On Hand—Concessions May Be Had—No Bathing Suits or Towels To Be Furnished—Large Crowd Expected On Opening Day

Hanging Rock Park, one of the favorites of North Carolina's beautiful park systems, will be formally opened to the public next Tuesday, July 4, under the supervision of Forest Warden and Park Caretaker Carl Ray Finchum.

R. J. Pearse, superintendent of North Carolina's State parks, was in Danbury today completing arrangements to make the park and its facilities available to the public. Mr. Pearse informed the Reporter that life guards will be on hand.

Mr. Pearse said that owing to war conditions, no bathing suits or towels would be furnished the public, and that these accessories should be brought by the bathers who wish to enjoy the lake. But the bathhouse, lake, and all other facilities which are now completed at the popular resort will be available.

Hanging Rock Park has cost something like one million dollars before being turned over to the State. It comprises several thousand acres of mountain and beautiful woodland. It will be under the supervision of J. W. Long, forest warden. Mr. Long left this week for the north. His place will be filled by Carl Ray Finchum, former game protector for the county.

It is expected that concessions for the sale of refreshments will be provided by opening day, but these have not yet been assured.
