# THE TAXES YOU *DO NOT* HAVE TO PAY

At the time of the other World War—when the government ran the railroads—you might have read in the papers this item of news:

"Washington, May 25, 1919—To finance the railroads for the balance of the year and to pay the government's operating loss for 16 months up to this month, an appropriation of \$1,200,000,000 was asked of Congress yesterday by the Director General of the United States Railroad Administration. The \$1,200,000,000 is in addition to the \$500,000,000 appropriated by the last Congress."

In contrast to these 1918-1919 appropriations of \$1,700,000,000 paid out by the government, in this war the railroads paid to government in the one year 1943, nearly \$2,000,000,000 in taxes.
