RATIONING NOTES

RATIONING CALENDAR FOR WEEK OF AUG. 7

PROCESSED FOODS—

Blue A5 through A5 (Book 4) now valid at 10 points each, for use with tokens. Good indefinitely. B5 through F5 become valid at 10 points each indefinitely on Aug. 1.

MEATS AND FATS—

Red A5 thru Z5 & A5 (Book 4) now valid at 10 points each, for use with tokens. Good indefinitely.

SUGAR—

Sugar stamps 30, 31 and 32 (Book 4) good for five pounds indefinitely.

CANNING SUGAR—

Sugar stamp 40 good for five pounds canning sugar until February 28, 1945.

SHOES—

Airplane stamps 1 and 2 (Book 3) valid indefinitely.

FUEL OIL—

Renewal applications for next season's fuel oil rations have been mailed out. As soon as coupons are received fuel oil tanks should be filled. Period 4 and 5 coupons for current season good until September 30. Period one coupons for next year now valid.

GASOLINE—

A-10 coupons now valid in Georgia, Florida, the Carolinas & Virginia. Expire August 8. A-11 coupons become valid Aug. 9.

Rationing rules now require that every car owner write his license number and state on all gasoline coupons in his possession as soon as they are issued him at the ration board.

Hail In Upper Stokes Does Some Damage—Saved By Insurance

Bob Hall of Lawsonville, who lives right close to the Virginia line in northern Stokes, was here Tuesday and told of a destructive hailstorm in his section last Friday two weeks ago, nearly. He said his own crop as well as the crops of Moir Rogers, Kimball Moore, Lum Hall, Ed Hall, Jasper Martin and Frank Wright were damaged. Fortunately, most of these farmers carried hail insurance of about \$100.00 per acre. Bob carried \$250.00 per acre on three acres, and none on three other acres. And funny to say, his three insured acres were hit by the hail, while his three uninsured acres were not hurt. Bob collected \$321.00 insurance, which was 44 1/2 per cent. of his insured acres.

Bob says he is busy these days hauling ice from Mt. Airy and other plants for the citizens of his section. He says most of the farms of the section have electric power, but many farmers have no refrigerators, being unable to get them at this time owing to war conditions.
