Flash In the Pan

who insisted upon resigning to serve as registrars until the following Saturday October 21. During the week of October 15 I made several trips to Hartman and contacted several persons who I tried to get to serve as registrars. I was unable to get anyone to serve and Mr. Alley, the regularly appointed registrar, turned the registration book for Hartman precinct over to me on Oct. 19. I made every possible effort to arrange to have a registrar on duty on the morning of Oct. 21, but was not successful in my efforts. I asked for and received the cooperation of several of the county officials in trying to persuade someone to take the books. On Oct. 21, shortly after noon, when it was called to my attention that there were several persons in Hartman precinct who desired to register and obtain transfers, and after a conference with party officials and candidates (of both parties), the registration books were temporarily placed in the hands of Mr. Will Wood (who I am advised attended the polling place at Hartman precinct and performed the duties of registrar late in the afternoon of Oct. 21 after attending a Republican rally at Danbury). On Oct. 24 the registration books were placed in the hands of Mr. H. G. Alley, permanent registrar, who has agreed to serve in such capacity throughout the election period.

"On Oct. 14 I visited Lawsonville community and endeavored to arrange for a registrar either temporary or permanent to take charge of the books immediately but was unable to accomplish this purpose. I interviewed eight or ten electors in Lawsonville precinct in company with prominent citizens of that community, in an effort to get a man on the job but could find no one who would take the books. I made two trips to Lawsonville that day with no success. On Tuesday, Oct. 24, I appointed Ralph Sheppard permanent registrar for Lawsonville precinct. He having agreed to serve throughout the election period. During the week, beginning Oct. 15, I discussed the Lawsonville incident with Mr. Raymond Maxwell, Executive Secretary of the State Board of Elections, Raleigh, and advised him of the fact that no registrar was on duty in the Lawsonville precinct on October 14. He told me to make every effort possible to have someone on duty the following Saturday.

"In neither of the precincts were the registration books ever held open to Democrats and not to Republicans. During the period when no registrar was on duty neither Democrats nor Republicans were registered and transfers were not issued for members of either party. During the period when the registrars were on duty, the books were open for the registration for Democrats and Republicans and for the transfer of electors for both parties."

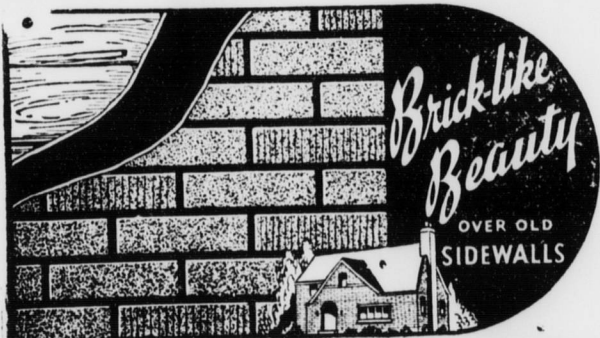

Urgent Need For Clerical Employees At Washington, D. C.

Edward Scheidt, Special Agent in Charge, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Charlotte, has announced that there is an urgent need for clerical employees in the Identification Division of the F. B. I. in Washington, D. C. To qualify for such a position, one must have a high school education or its equivalent, and must be 16 years of age or over. Employment is available on either a 48- or 60-hour week basis. The starting salary for those working a 48-hour week is \$1752 per annum. For those choosing to work a 60-hour week, the starting salary is \$2100 per year. No previous experience or knowledge of typing or shorthand is necessary.

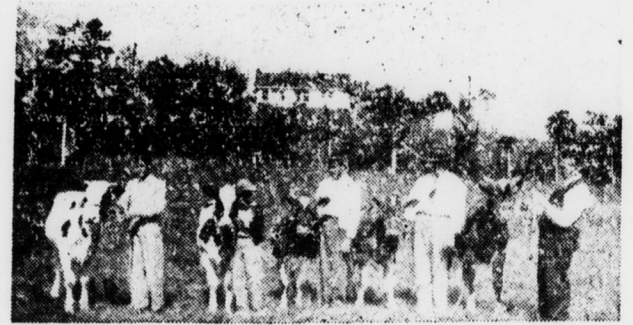
