Interesting Draft Figures

According to information from the local selective service office, Stokes county has now in the armed forces approximately 1,425 men. This includes the contingents sent this week, some of which will doubtless be rejected.

About 6 1-2 percent. of the county's population of 22,000 is in the service.

In this connection it will doubtless be interesting to a number of people to know that out of the town of Danbury's 220 population, 28 men are in the service, or about 13 1-2 per cent.

In other words if the county as a whole furnished proportionately as many soldiers and sailors as the county seat has supplied, we would have 2970 men in the service from our county.

The above is not written in disparagement of the showing of any particular section of the county, but we felt like it would not be unfair to let the public know the county seat is doing its bit.
