CONDUCTOR KILLED!

Colonel Dowd Sends Us Word of a Fatal Accident.

MAY CONCLUDE TO REMAIN LONGER

The following concerning the Dowd & good excursion is of interest:

We brought a good crowd from Durham and took them on along the road as far as Hillsboro. Everybody sober and seemed to be happy. Nothing happened to mar the pleasure of our party until we were within about three or four miles of Hillsboro, when Conductor Chamberlain of the Petersburg and Weldon road, was killed. He was leaning over, holding on to the railing, the while noticing the boys, when his head came in contact with a post, striking him across the forehead, killing him instantly.

We arrived here at 5 p. m. Colonels (Dowd), Tom Carrington, John Smith, and the rest of the party never looked happier. We leave here to-morrow at 5 p. m. unless we conclude to spend a few more days over here, which some of the party desire to do. Down.

A CORRECTION.

They Tell Why It Was that the Y. M. C. A. Died at Hillsboro.

TO THE EDITOR:—Seeing an article in your paper this week, charging that the Y. M. C. A. of Hillsboro was killed by a minister of one of our churches and a deacon of another, we beg leave, in behalf of justice, to give our version. We think the prime cause of its death was because some of the active members wished to get out and did not have the moral pluck to resign. There was not a minister present at either one of the last meetings. The whole plan was nastily gotten up and pushed through with the aid of some who had not been in the hall in six months, all of which was contrary to the constitution and by laws.
