

### EXTRA SESSION WAY CLEAR

Overthrowing the tradition of more than a century, the United States senate has roted to adopt a limitation ensenate debate. By a rote of 70 to 3 it adopted a rule imposing a modified form of cloture on the upper bouse. The rule will clear the way for action on President Wilson's demand authorizing him to inactive armed neutrality if he cuits an extra session of congress. Recently the president said the unitinated debate rule in the senate would make the cuiling of an extra session on the question of armed neutrality fullie.


