Geshen Church

The oldest Presbylerian organization in Gaston county has had peculiar difficulty in preserving its life during the last year. One of its old Pastors-the late Rev. J. D. Hallwho served it continuously for 25 years and who lived near the church, died in August last, old and long infirm. He always attended its services after be ceased to proach and his family grew up around his and his sons became its constant supporters and buried t is remainin the old cemetary, where he had so often ministered at funerals of his neighbors and members. It is the oldest and largest grave yard in the county and has been enlarger and enclosed with hewn granit walls and is the resting place of multi. tudes of excellent people whose friends and children are in all sections of the country. In 1887 the old house of worship was remodeled, repaired and rainted and a large and orderly congregation gathered there and the membership was increasing and responding to the calls of Presbytery. But the members were widely scattered and more easily could assemble at three other places than they could all meet at the old house of worship, and as they begun to develop in their church life and the young people became interested, they began to locate their religious life at more convenient places; and in 1890 a new church was organized at Bel mont station on the Air Line Rail Road and in 1891 another one was organized at Stanley Creek station. on the C. C. R. R. These organizations reduced the membarship and greatly weakened the old organization and as most of the remaining members lived near the old church and at Mr. Holly, it was a greed to move the old organization to M: Holly as soon as a house of Worship could be built there. In January 1892 the new Presbyterian house of Worship was in sight at Mr. Helly and the pastor announced regular services would be conducted at 11 a. m. on 1st Sundays in the Lutheran church until their church building would be completed.
