reports showed six thousand families of Northern or western origin.

Two days were given to "experience meeting," and the testimonies were without exception that they had been received most courteously, that their relations with the native-born citizens were most kindly and pleasant, that there was no interference with their political freedom of thought or act, and that they were all prosperous.
