Resolutions of Respect.

A meeting of the citizens of Lincoln was called by B. C. Cobb, Esq., Intend. P. T. to express the grief of this town and community at the loss sustained by the death of our "Old War" Governor and late Senator Zeb. B. Vance.

The meeting was held in the Court House, and largely attended. Mr. B. C. Cobb stated the object of the meeting in a short speech in which he paid tribute to the late Senator in elegant language. Rev. R. Z. Johnston was called and led in prayer and a committee on resolutions was appointed, consisting of Rev. R. Z. Johnston, Dr. W. L. Crouse and L. B. Wetmore. The following resolutions were reported and adopted.

North Carolina, April 18, 1894.

WHEREAS, Almighty God in His wise providence has released from its earthly fetters the soul of our beloved Senator Zebulon B. Vance; and whereas we are desirous of paying some loving tribute to his illustrious memory; therefore we the citizens of Lincoln, and Lincoln County, in mass meeting assembled do

RESOLVE, 1st, That in the death of Senator Vance, North Carolina has lost one of her most illustrious and devoted sons; that the nation has lost one of its ablest and wisest statesmen, and humanity at large has lost one of its greatest benefactors.

RESOLVE, 2nd, That as an orator he was peerless; as a companion genial; as a soldier fearless and brave; in intellect quick; in virtue strong and in true manhood unsurpassed.

RESOLVE, 3rd, That we tender our heartfelt sympathy to the family of the late Senator and commend them to the loving care of "Him who doeth all things well."

RESOLVE, 4th, That the Lincoln Courier and the Charlotte Observer be asked to publish these resolutions, and that a copy of same be sent to the bereaved widow of the deceased.

Further Proceedings of Presbytery.

On Thursday 11 a. m. M. C. Airwood, member of Long Creek church Gaston county, formerly a student of Piedmont Seminary here, and henceforth to preach last year, was ordained to the Ministry. Rev. R. F. Campbell of Asheville preached the sermon and Rev. J. A. Preston D. D., of Charlotte, delivered the charge.

Rev. Jos. K. Hall, of King's Mt., was dismissed to Bethel Presbytery, S. C. On Thursday evening after sermon by Rev. T. A. Wharton, pastor of Steele Creek church Mecklenburg county, the Communion service was conducted and then a memorial sketch of the late Rev. G. D. Parks was read by Rev. Roger Martin, pastor of Mallard Creek church, Mecklenburg Co., and several affectionate tributes to

the deceased were made. On Wednesday evening a Foreign Missionary service was held, the Agent, Rev. Jesse W. Siler presiding, and Rev. T. R. Sampson, Secretary of Synod of N. C. made a very interesting address.

Revs. H. M. Dixon, and Jesse W. Siler were elected Commissioners to the General Assembly to meet in Nashville Tenn. May 17th, with Revs. G. A. Sparrow and J. A. Preston D. D. Alternates respectively.

Jno W Moore, elder in Huntersville church and C. E. Graham elder in 1st church Asheville church were elected Commissioners to the General Assembly with Dr. Chas. Adams of Gastonia and John E. Brown of Charlotte alternates respectively.

A call from Rutherfordton church for Rev. G. A. Hough was approved and Revs. R. Z. Johnston and W. P. McCorkie were appointed to install him as pastor.

Order was made that Revs. Johnston, McCorkie and Miller, John F. Tiddy of Shelby, organize a church at Latimore's Station in Cleveland county on the 5th Sunday in April.

Revs. Dixon, Johnston and Black and Elder Stevens of Monroe were appointed a Committee to arrange programme for the proper observance of the 25th Anniversary of the organization of the Presbytery, October 16th 1869.

The Colored Evangelistic work was presented in a report and a collection of \$44.00 was given for the immediate relief of the work.

The following resolutions were offered by Dr. Preston and adopted by a rising vote:

1st. RESOLVED that the hearty and unanimous thanks of Mecklenburg Presbytery be extended to the congregation and people of Lincoln for their abundant and cordial hospitality and that a rich blessing be invoked upon Pastor and people.

2nd. That the thanks of Presbytery are extended to the various churches of Lincoln for their cordial hospitalities and christian courtesies in offering to Presbytery the use of their pulpits.

At noon on Friday Presbytery adjourned to meet in Charlotte May 10th to examine and license candidates.

The Moderator made a beautiful closing address.

Rev. Chalmers Moore, pastor of Hopewell church preached Friday evening, Rev. R. Martin Saturday forenoon and Rev. H. M. Parker, pastor of Swannanoa church, Buncombe county, Saturday evening.

Rev. J. L. Williamson, pastor of Sugar Creek church, Mecklenburg county preached Sunday forenoon, after which the New House of worship was dedicated, Rev. R. F. Campbell offered the prayer and Rev. J. T. Williamson gave the charge to the officers of the church.

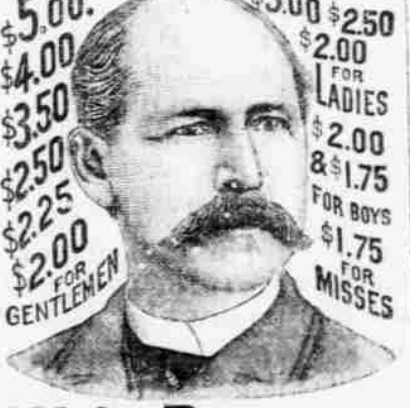
