1,000,000 Bad Carcasses.

More than 50,000,000 animals were inspected during the past fiscal year by the United States Bureau of animal industry, and more than 1,000,000 carcasses were condemned as unfit for food, according to the annual report of Dr. A. D. Melvin, submitted to Secretary of Agriculture Wilson. Tuberculosis was the cause of most of the condemnations, nearly 47 per cent of adult cattle condemnations and more than 96 per cent of those hogs being due to this disease.

John D. Declines With Thanks.

The Congressional committee investigation of the United States Steel Corporation invited John D. Rockefeller and Rev. Fiedesick T. Gates to appear before that committee to testify in the matter of the Morris, in which the latter had charged before the committee that Rockefeller had "squeezed" them out of mining properties and other values amounting to several millions, but both declined to avail themselves of the opportunity of defending the deal by testifying, contenting themselves with making public statements through the press.

Mr. Rockefeller is an ardent defender of himself and his methods. He can see no harm in the methods he has employed to accumulate the vast fortune he enjoys, and of course much of it was gained in the way he appropriated to his own use the Merritt properties, embracing vast mining interests and a railroad which are now worth millions of dollars. - Nashville Tennessean.

Boy Kills Himself.

A telephone message received at Taylorsville from S. O. Point states that Roy Keever, son of Jesse Keever who lives about two miles south of that place, accidentally shot himself about 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon and died as a result thirty minutes thereafter.

The young man was in the wood's chopping when the accident occurred. He had laid his gun against a log and when he attempted to move it, it was discharged by the hammer coming in contact with a knot on the log. The entire load entered his side. A physician was sent for at once, but the young man died before he arrived. He was about 17 years of age. Charlotte Observer.
