

> Flood conditions in West Virginia have become serious. Eastern Pennsylvania is suffering severely. Many anthracite mines are shut down.


Vandalism in West Indianapolis caused a threat of martial law. Several deaths fram drowning have oc. cured. Organized relief work has been begun in Indiana flood districts. Northern and western New York are flood stricken. Heavy property damage has followed in the Hudson and Mohawk valleys and in the western part of the southern tier.

Trains are moving with food, medical help and supplies and other necessaries into the flood territory. Progress is slow on account of washouts and tottering bridges. The railroads are working hard to make repairs.

Relief funds are swelling throughout the nation. Hundreds of thousands whom the hunters wanted most of all of dollars are already available. The as wielders of the fatal guns, were Red Cross is playing a prominent part in the relief measures.

Seven states are seriously affected by the widening flood area. They are Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia, Pennsyvania, New York, Kentucky and Illinois In all these railroad trafic is paralyzed or greatly hampered. Damage to railroad property alone may reach \$25,000,000. Telegraph and telephone wires are down on all sides. Large forces are making repairs, but progress isslow.


