Immediately the ships crew recovered from the shock of the collision and when it was seen that the liner had received a vital blow a wireless "S. O. S." call was sounded.

HURRY TO RESCUE.

The hurried appeal was picked up by the Government mail tender Lady Evelyn and the Government pilot boat Eureka at Father Point, and both set out to the rescue. So deep was the hurt of the Empress, however, and so fast the inrush of waters, that long before either of the rescue boats could reach the scene the liner had gone down. Only floating wreckage and a few lifeboats and rafts from the steamer, buoying up less than a third of those who had set sail on her, were to be found. The rest had sunk with the liner, had been crushed to death in the Storstad's impact with her, or had been forced from exposure in the icechilled waters to loose their hold on bits of wreckage and had drowned.
