Truly this is a time of misery. Nature joins with the demons of warfare to increase the suffering of Europe. Italy may remain neutral with the warring nations but she cannot remain so with dame nature's militarism—the earthquake.

Theories on the cause and effect of the European war are galore; speculations of the outcome and the effect on future Europe and the world are innumerable; none of these are acceptable conclusively for the fact that bias determines men's belief and opinions. Unprejudiced History is the only criterion and that leads us to conclude that whatever the effect and change it may have on the physical world the hearts of men will be refined and the world will be placed on a higher plane of justice and equality. The miseries and woes of men are sacrifices on the altar of civilization.

Senator McNeely, of Union county has introduced in the upper house of the Legislature, a bill to provide for a direct primary. We are proud to see one man step out and offer such a constructive measure. This is a law that North Carolina greatly needs in order to be numbered with the progressive states of the Union. In our opinion it is a conservative step toward more direct government in North Carolina. As ever one knows this bill is to place party nominations into the hands of the people. It's a naked fact that a party is a most potential factor in a democratic government, because a party is the instrument through which the people select their servants and express policies. It is also a fact that a party's purpose will be thwarted if we do not provide means that will hold them responsible to the people. As we all know there is a tendency for a political organization to become derogatory to the people's needs in that they have an eye single to their own preservation. The great organizations of the country, such as Tammany Hall of New York, are the results of this delegation of the people's part in the government without them retaining means of directing the control of this right that they have transferred to the parties. The good people of the state if they in the state's welfare and not any party's should rise up in their might and make the passage of this bill mandatory on the General Assembly.

We have noticed in the papers that Mr. William E. White of our town has been suggested as prospective candidate for the Republican nomination for government. We note this suggestion with much pride as we feel that

not only Alamance county would be honored with Mr. White as a candidate, but also the town of Mebane feels highly honored that she should have a man that was of gubernatorial timber. Of course we view this suggestion of Mr. White for governor from an independent attitude, although we are aware of the high character and actual worth of Mr. White as a citizen and we feel that the good people of Mebane, regardless of Politics are appreciative of Mr. White because they have observed his qualities as a man. Also the town of Mebane joins in the hearty commendation of him. Mr. White is a public spirited man and is intensely interested in the welfare of the State. He has already proved his business qualifications in the success of the well known White Furniture Co. He is sometime known as the "Furniture King" of the South.

The following from the Chicago Tribune should give every thoughtful man serious concern. Today we are facing more self-consciously than for many years problems that are old dark and of common concern to us all; war, price, trade, progress, decay, the fate of men and the destiny of nations. It is not possible for us to confront this great domestic problem of unemployment in a new spirit, with a determination to deal with it in a larger way? Throughout the country communities are unusually active this winter in charitable work and in dealing each with their local problems of unemployment.—Selected.

Farming in Norway.
The hill farmers of the Norwegian fjords have a curious way of drying the grass, or making the hay. They erect three-barred fences, the bars being about a foot apart, at intervals in the fields, and hang the grass on the bars, where it is quickly dried by the sun and wind. These districts are for the most part very sparsely populated, and in many cases the farms are as much as two days' journey from the nearest village.
