Monroe, Jan. 13.—One of the most tragic deaths that has occurred in Union county, was that of Mrs. Virgie Helms, wife of Thomas Helms, Saturday. The account of the unfortunate young mother, who was found lying in the yard with her infant crawling over the body, has just reached Monroe. At the time of the death Mr. Helms was not at home, and the body was not found until a neighbor, Marvin Gordon, passing, saw it lying in the yard. On going into the yard, Mr. Gordon found the three little children of the dead mother, playing, and on asking them what was the matter with their mother they replied that "they didn't know." On further examination, Mr. Gordon found the body cold. It was supposed that the mother, on crossing the yard, was stricken with heart failure. Mrs. Helms was 25 years old, and a member of Corinth Baptist church.
