Mr. John M. Slaton, ex-Governor of Georgia may have committed an error in giving Leo M. Frank the Jew the benefit of a doubt in commuting his sentence from death to life imprisonment, but it was a perfectly legitimate error, it was just such an error that he as Governor of Georgia had a right to commit without question, and since he innocently, and with best purposes and intents committed it, it was his right without question, but the sore shame of the whole business was that Georgia should have had a citizenship capable of a mob demonstration because he did exercise this right. There are few if any States that have so disgraced themselves as has Georgia in this matter. Of course it must be admitted that the men who constituted this mob were not composed of the Letter element of the State, the thinking class. Yet Georgia will be judged by what this vicious element did.

There were good and sufficient reasons for the course that Governor Slaton acted upon, but the outrageous shame of those who protested that they should have based their protest largely upon the fact that Frank was a Jew. Evidently as the matter appears today it was a framed-up case largely based upon racial prejudice reared upon the evidence of a criminal of exceedingly common origin, for after you take out the evidence of Conly the negro upon whose statement he was convicted there was nothing in it, Conly said that Frank was a degenerate, the membership of the church to which Frank belonged said he was an exemplary young man. Conly was speaking the wishes of a lot of Jew haters and was believed, reputable members of Frank's race was telling what these did not want to hear, and was not believed.

It has not been long since Mr. Bryan claimed it would be an unethical act for this country to refuse to sell arms to any of the belligerent nations who were able to buy them. The German Americans of this country have been carrying on a crusade with a view of influencing popular sentiment against this country selling arms, or ammunition to any country because they knew that Germany could not purchase and receive them and they wished to cripple other nations. Since Mr. Bryan has resigned the secretaryship and gone out in the world as a true advocate of German sympathy he takes the view, or at least advocates it, that this country should sell arms and ammunition to no country. Mr. Bryan knows that Germany could not get them shipped into that country. Is that the reason why? It looks so.

Norfolk is buying crude petroleum for road and street improvement purposes at 3 cts per gallon in 5000 gallon lots. We have all the time contended that a leveled up and hard packed clay street well saturated with petroleum so as to make it waterproof would make a cheap and good street. Water would not stand on it if it were properly elevated in the center, and if you will keep the water off a road, it wont cut up in holes. But whether petroleum is gotten or some other means devised it is certainly urgent that some effort should be made to give permanence to the improvement of Mebane streets.

So Gen. Victoriano Huerta has again shown his ugly foot to Uncle Sam. He came here some months ago and took apartments in New York City assuring our government officials that his mission was of the most peaceful character, that he meant no harm and would do none, now we find him on the border of Mexico trying to recruit men for an invasion of Mexico. As soon as this government learned of his mission he was promptly arrested, and held with those who were with him, for an investigation.

FOES LIVE IN SAME TRENCH

When Fighting Wanes South of Ypres Germans Move in With Allies.

Boulogne—A British soldier relates a remarkable story of how the English and Germans huddled in the same trench a few miles south of Ypres. There were a handful of Germans and a smaller handful of allied forces. Trenches were but a few yards apart, and in these for more than a week the men of both sides had been bored and inactive. They amused themselves as best they could, exchanging messages, swapping newspapers and tobacco, hurling back and forth greetings and epithets.

More days passed and still neither side received orders either to attack or to withdraw. Some sort of co-operation seemed necessary. Accordingly the Germans hoisted a white flag and, advancing under this, entered the allied trench for a conference. The result was that an agreement was reached that it would be more comfortable for all to live in one trench until one side or the other received orders.

The Germans moved over bag and baggage, and for a number of days all went well. Many of the Germans spoke English or French. Under the strange arrangement both sides were surprised.

Both factions dreaded the arrival of a messenger. One day a messenger came, and plans for the renewal of hostilities were hastily made. But the messenger proved to be only a bearer of mail and newspapers for the Germans. All gathered around while a German began to translate the latest dispatch from Berlin.

Unhappily for the harmony of the gathering, it referred to Ostend by its German nickname, "Kales," spoke of bomb-droppings on various French towns and of contemplated air raids on Great Britain. The English frowned, growled; the French grew excited. Both sides had by agreement laid aside their rifles; but both sides still had their fists. Both used them. A free-for-all fight followed, and the unique compact came to an end.

ALBERT IS IDOL OF FRENCH

Belgian Monarch as King of France and Belgium is Cry of Parisians.

Paris.—"Albert I, king of the French and of the Belgians," was the inscription recently cut on a few sows by a French engraver to amuse himself, says the Oeuvre, and already people who have seen the inscription or heard of it are crying, "That's not such a bad idea."

The Belgian king is great-grandson of Louis Philippe, and if there were thought of returning to a monarchy he would be in the line of succession. He would be a very popular aspirant, in view of his course in the war.

One of the honors proposed for him by his Parisian admirers is to change the name of the Avenue du Bois de Boulogne to the Avenue Albert I. This is the thoroughfare by which all sovereigns visiting Paris are conducted from the Bois station to their headquarters in the city.

PIQUET WAR IN TRENCHES

Soldiers Have Regular Championship Matches Along the Battle Lines.

Paris.—Piquet, says the Figaro, is the favorite diversion of the French troops in the trenches along the battle lines. Some remarkable games are played between the crack players of the different companies.

Many of the contests are broken off suddenly by the bursting of shrapnel in or near the trenches. Not infrequently a game ends in a "dead" hand when some unfortunate player "passes out" forever while holding the winning cards.
