It was deliberate, and wilful murder then, and he was just as much responsible for the crime then as he would be were he to commit it now. That when Stanford Whites lips were closed in death Thaw with his paid witnesses tried to prove that he was justifiable in killing him and some weak minded American citizens are converts to the same idea. Stanford White was worth a thousand Thaws, then if he is to be justifiable in murdering Stanford White, there are a number of men who should be justifiable in shooting the brains out of some lecherous scamps in this state, and they would be if they had Thaws money behind them.

Austria sticks her mouth into it, and tries to bull doze the United States by telling her if we get into war with Germany we shall have to fight her and Turkey, my, my, that is fearful. The United States does not have to be told the risk it incurs even in protesting against the murderous assaults of Germany, but we trust Mr. Wilson will give no attention to Austrias gibberish, even though it was advised by Germany.

There was every proof in the treatment of the ex-Governor, that the State was a seething hot bed of Jewish fanaticism and hate, and despite what other, and better men thought, this wild mad idea of revenge, would plot and plan every device for Franks injury. His guilt or innocence has absolutely nothing to do with the question. He was in the care and keeping of the great State of Georgia and since it had assumed full charge of his person, and his liberty it was its duty to give to him ample and full protection. He was

especially an object of revenge and hate, and it could have been reasonably surmised, that if he could be struck, some one would strike him. He should have been given isolated quarters at least until popular fury had abated. To have locked him up in a room at night among eighty or one hundred vicious cut-throats, was to invite the very thing that occurred. We do not say that the Millidville authorities were wilfully criminal, but their neglect amounts to criminality. Governor Harris has ordered an investigation, and if they can get under the truth it may reveal a conspiracy.

### THAW DECLARED SANE

"The verdict of the jury that Harry Thaw is sane was not unexpected. His fate rests with Justice Hendrix. Most people will be glad to see the State rid of his case.

Murder in the first degree or an insanity verdict was the alternative logically confronting the original trial jury. It chose the more merciful judgment, at the impassioned urgings of Thaw's counsel, after a trial that hurt the repute of American courts as far as telegraph wires stretch and newspapers are printed. Spared as insane, Thaw demanded instant release as a sane man. In the disgusted words of one of his lawyers, he thought he should have been sentenced not to Matteawan but to a Tenderloin restaurant.

A poor man in his position would have dropped out of sight. Backed by vast wealth in hands which no scruple hampered in its use, Thaw began the long struggle which vexed the too patient courts until a Federal Judge was found in a sister State who denied the right of New York to reclaim an escaped prisoner, and until the Supreme Court in Washington had to be invoked to end an intolerable situation.

Though all these years the slime of the Thaw money has stained better men than he. It has ruined reputations, filled prison cells, closed promising careers in dishonored death. It has left its trail of debauchery through many States and a neighbor country. Everywhere it has incited greed, rewarded treachery, stirred up filth.

Sanity is a matter of opinion, a matter of degree, a matter of fact; and the fact can be ascertained. Thaw was held to be insane when he killed White. He is held to be sane now. If he shall be released he will at least not have gone scatheless for his crime, and New York will be well satisfied to hear less and see nothing of him in the future.

## HAS KNOWN MANY MASTERS

Famous Polish City of Cracow Four Times Under Domination of Invading Army.

"Cracow, in Poland, which has been the object of the fiercest fighting between Germans, Austrians, and Russians, is a city little known to Americans, but rich in historic interest and one of the most wonderful cities in the world," said Louis Lawlor of New York, a world traveler. "Cracow, it is said, was founded by Krakus, builder of the fortress known as Wawel, and until 1764 all of Poland's kings were crowned there.

"The sacred shrine of Cracow is the Wawel, a small fortified city including a cathedral, chapels, barracks, dwelling houses, and courtyards, all surrounded by a high wall with corner towers. The cathedral crypt is the resting place of most of the monarchs of Poland. Wawel lately has been restored. With its gold, silver, jewels, stained glass, sculptures, metal carvings, and marbles, the cathedral is of great interest to all students of art and history. The great altar is supported by four massive columns.

"The University of Cracow was founded in 1364 and grew into a university from a library founded by Casimir the Great. In the city square is a stone tablet commemorative of the spot where in 1794 Kosciusko assumed command of the Polish army. It is said that the playhouse at Cracow is one of the most wonderful in Europe, and many famous plays have had their original production there. The city of Cracow was four times in the hands of foreign invaders. It is not so European a metropolis as Warsaw, but has always remained a characteristic Polish town. Should the fortunes of war bring another invasion of Cracow the inhabitants would not be surprised, for at different times the Bohemian, Mongol, Prussian, Swede, Tartar, Russian, and Austrian armies have marched through its streets. It is one of the important strongholds of Austria."

## Hints on Golf for Women.

Woman players, especially beginners, are inclined to swing the club so far around that they are thrown off their balance and the club swings the woman instead of the woman the club. This fault can be corrected by keeping a tight grip on the club at all times during the swing, as it is the loosened hold that allows the head of the club to drop too near the ground. In the drive, which requires the fullest swing of any of the strokes except perhaps the brass shot, the shaft of the club at the top of the swing should not go beyond the horizontal.

There is another point that woman players, even experienced ones, are apt to neglect, and that is the rules of the game. There have been many matches in which players have been disqualified through the unconscious disregard or breaking of some rule. A book of general rules can be purchased at any place where golf clubs are sold, and the local or ground rules of each club are printed on the score cards of that club, so there is no excuse for any one being in a state of ignorance.—Outing.

## Noted American Soldier.

William Irvine, one of the descendants of a notable family of soldiers, was born at Enniskillen, Ireland, November 3, 1741. His grandfather was an officer in the corps of the grenadiers which fought so fiercely at the battle of the Boyne. In 1776 he and many others were taken prisoners at Trois Rivieres, were confined at Quebec, and were not exchanged until 1778, when he was put in command of the Second Pennsylvania brigade with the rank of brigadier general. He was sent to Fort Pitt in 1782 to guard the western frontier. In 1786 he was elected to congress from the Carlisle district. In 1794 he commanded the Pennsylvania troops sent to Pittsburgh to suppress the "Whiskey Rebellion." Having settled in Philadelphia in 1801 he was made superintendent of military stores and died in that city July 29, 1894. He was for a time president of the Society of the Cincinnati at Pennsylvania.

## Show-Window Aids.

Show-window lamps that can be adjusted to bring out to the best advantage goods of any particular color, such as green silks one day, for instance, and cotton goods with orange designs the next day, have now been perfected and are just getting to the point of going on the market. Glass strips of various colors that the light rays from an electric lamp, make a mosaic pattern of the rays, and then gather them all together again, blending the light into a daylight effect. By adjusting the glass strips the outgoing light can be modified so that it will intensify red or any other color, as desired. Such lights have been suggested for art-gallery use.

## Radio Controls Boat's Course.

As far as the eye can see, with the aid of a telescope, the movements of a small boat off shore, it is now possible to control such a craft laden with a heavy charge of dynamite, by the use of the radio system, in the opinion of Brig. Gen. Weaver, chief of the coast artillery. Experiments which the army is watching are now in progress, with the object of applying this system of control to a submerged torpedo. It is believed that the problem already has been solved so that an operator on shore can direct such torpedoes with surety against an enemy's battleship fleet lying several miles out at sea.
