While none of the defendants may go to the electric chair it will be necessary to abolish such crimes as that tried in Winston last week called the Muddy creek murder mystery, in which three parties are implicated before there will appear a reason for doing away with capital punishment. It is all tommy rot to speak of letting the man or woman go free that murders, and imprisonment is but slightly better, especially with a professional pardoning governor. If North Carolina had electrocuted even fifty per cent of her murderers, she would have reduced that species of crime more than seventy five per cent. The man or woman that opposes capital punishment, unconsciously encourages crimes, and are an enemy to law and order. Limitless experience in other countries has demonstrated it wont do to abolish capital punishment. Don't say that North Carolina has a rigidly enforced law on capital punishment, for she has not, and never will have until you educate the men that fill her jury boxes. An ignorant man is a weak tool in the hands of a shrewd lawyer, that is all there is about it, you seldom convict.

Although Christy, and Mrs. Warren the parties charged with the Muddy Creek murder at Winston have both been sentenced to die in the electric chair in September, but watch and see if it is not "a long way to tipperary." Christy may go but Mrs. Warren, the guilty of the two will remain as an example of the sickly sentimentalism of the long haired men and short haired women, of wasted and foolish sympathy endeavoring to interfere with the execution of the stern yet charitable laws of even handled justice.

Some of our exchange Editors after Becker's denial of his guilt reaches the conclusion that possibly after all Becker was innocent, and because of this doubt that Becker's sentence should have been commuted to life imprisonment. Despite the fact Becker professed to be a devout Catholic, we had no faith in any of his professions of innocence. If Becker had been a devout Catholic he never would have become implicated in the Rosenthal murder. A conviction at two separate trials furnished the best of reasons for presuming his guilt. New York State has too finer code of criminal law to convict for fun or prejudice. When its courts found him guilty of murder, and fixed his punishment electrocution we were satisfied justice was holding the scales.

If he was guilty as charged and proven then he should have been electrocuted. The assumption that New York society would have lost nothing from a commutation of his sentence to life imprisonment is incorrect. New York society would have lost much from the very element that Charles Becker gave the weight of his influence and power to where he served upon the police force of New York city, in encouraging them to do further crimes. Don't tell us that the horrible taking of off Charles Becker had no influence as a deterrent upon the gang he associated with, and others of

like ilk for we do not believe it. The atmosphere among the common thugs, the criminal element of New York is purer, better, and less dangerous by far than it would otherwise have been.

We take no stock in the sickly sentimentalism that electrocution should stop. The State of North Carolina makes but little effort to stop the pistol "toting" habit, it makes none to stop the sales of pistols in pawn shops, but according to these sap heads it should make an effort to stop the electrocution of a man who had shot some defenseless fellow because he the shooter was mad, for wanted revenge. A country that abolishes capital punishment, is a country that is allowing sympathy and sentiment to run riot with common sense, and is willing to sacrifice good citizens to satisfy the criminal desires of the assassin, the murderer and the human butcher.

If the European governments were under the control of Republican administrators and a spirit of modern democracy dominated them, instead of as conditions exist to day, to be ruled by Kings and Emperors, then there would be no war, and in the place of breaking hearts, and oceans of blood, and dying millions there would be peace, sweet peace.

The land lust of the greedy grasping cormorants of Germany the Emperor, William and his family of war lords would find other diversion than those of building pyramids out of human bones, and decorating marshes and generals with the iron cross for crushing Belgium and adding Warsaw as an other jewel to their bloody crowns.

If Germany is crushed it must be crushed with schrapnell, and cannon blast. The silly policy of England, to starve out Germany has long been exploded and proven utterly abortive, the only thing it accomplished was to give Germany and excuse for her brutal submarine policy, nothing else. England has done virtually nothing to end the war but talk. By this time she should have had three million men in the field well drilled and hardened soldiers, but she has not got one third of them and her silly methods does not permit her to get them. England starvation policy is a fake, and despite the falsehoods of Germany she does not seriously consider it.

### Efficiency of Arc Lamps.

The use of arc lamps under high atmospheric pressure has been reported by Professor Lummer of Breslau, to give great increase in efficiency. Under 20 amperes, the temperature of the arc was raised from about 4,500 to 7,500 per cent, and the brightness increased to 18 times the ordinary.

### Make Cheap Barometer.

A weather man described the other day a cheap, homemade barometer. He said it was only necessary to take a piece of string about fifteen inches long and to soak it several hours in a strong solution of salt and water. After being dried the string should have a light weight tied to one end and be hung up against a wall, a mark being made to show where the weight reaches. The barometer is now complete. It is as accurate as a \$100 instrument. The weight rises for wet weather and falls for fine.

### What "Penny" of Nails Mean.

The terms ten-penny, etc., as applied to nails came from the number in a pound, pronounced pun. Nails of such a size that it took 1,000 of them to weigh four, six, eight or ten pounds were popularly known as four-pun' nails, six-pun' nails, eight-pun' nails and ten-pun' nails, respectively; and in the course of time, four-pun' nails, six-pun' nails, etc., were gradually corrupted to the meaningless four-penny nails, six-penny nails, etc.

### To Melt Paraffin.

Take a large empty tomato can or any other large can; cut it off from the top all around about two inches from the bottom with a can opener. It is large enough for any jar and deep enough to paraffin a little way past the cover of the jar if there is enough paraffin in when melted to fill can three-fourths full. It can be put right on the stove and the paraffin melts very quickly.
