Thursday Afternoon Book Club.

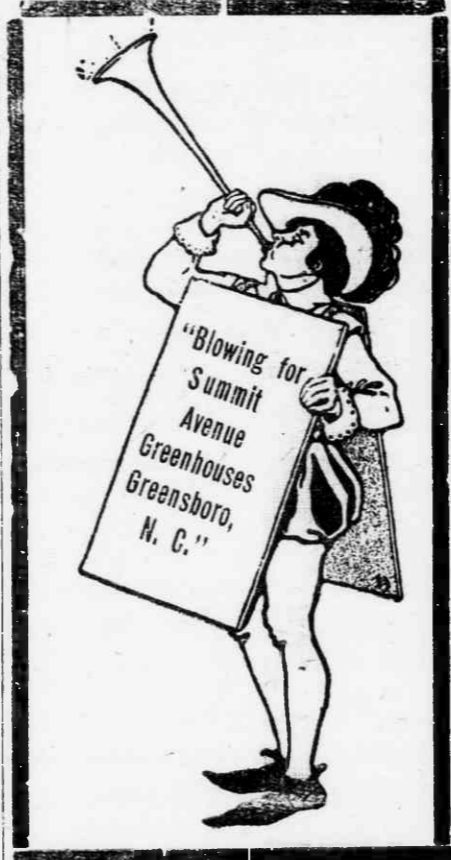

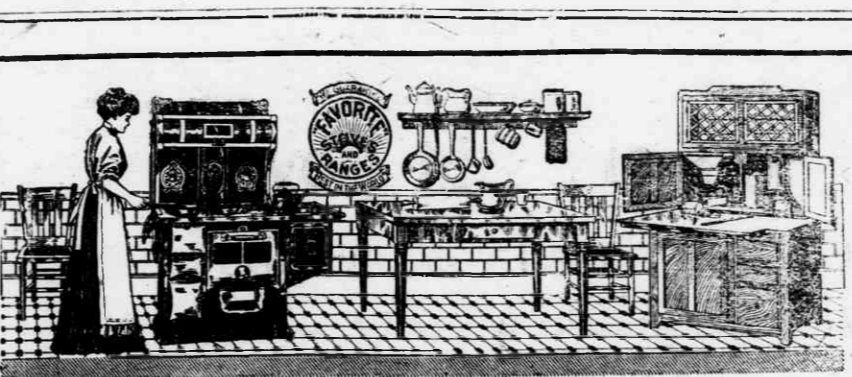
