Much of Food on Pacific

Coast Awaits Shipment. San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 24.-Thou sands of tons of foodstuffs on the Pacific coast are awaiting purchase and proportion of their paper stocks. The shipment east, commission men said here today. Of rice alone, there are 125,000,000 pounds and the price is lower than it has been for several years. Authorities also said there are millions of bushels of potatoes and beans besides canned and dried fruit and vegetables a plenty.

The San Francisco chamber of commerce telegraphed the Interstate Commerce commission asking it to permit the use of 250 refrigerator cars immediately. A traffic expert of the chamber of commerce estimated California could export between 200 and 300 cars of foodstuffs a day if the proper cars were available.
