More Than 150 Warships Busy

Cleveland, O., April 6.—A great fleet of American war-ships, numbering more than 150 vessels, and including, in addition to the far-famed destroyers, battleships, cruisers, submarines, gunboats, coast guard cutters, converted yachts, tugs and other auxiliaries, is operating in the war zone.

Manning this fleet, and the many small submarine chasers, which are not reckoned in the total, and doing duty on shore patrol and at the supply stations ashore, are 35,000 officers and men, half the navy's personnel when the nation entered the war just a year ago.

These hitherto carefully guarded facts were disclosed here today by Secretary Daniels in an address at a celebration marking the opening of the third Liberty loan campaign. Mr. Daniels said that while he was not at liberty to tell the toll the fleet has taken of German submarines, the nation could "rest assured that our forces have inflicted telling losses upon the enemy."

"As an instance of naval activities," said the secretary, "I may cite the work of one detachment of destroyers for a six-month period. Total miles steamed in war areas, 1,000,000; submarines attacked, 81; single vessels escorted, 717; convoys escorted, 86; total number of days at sea, 3,600

"The navy has furnished every aid possible that the countries aligned with us in the war have requested or suggested, and has worked in the closest co-operation with them. Our forces have played an important part in the war against the submarines, and have aided materially in the marked reduction in sinkings of merchantment as compared with the number sunk in the corresponding period a year ago, and in the no less notable increase in the number of submarines destroyed."

Under Vice Admiral Sims, who is in supreme command of all American naval forces in the war zone, are four rear admirals with stations in Europe, said the secretary, they are Henry B. Wilson, in France, Albert T. Niblack, in the south; Hugh Rodman, in command of battleships and Herbert O. Dunn, on special duty.

"The navy has made a record of which we may well be proud," declared Mr. Daniels. "But much more must be done. Ours has been a modest accomplishment in comparison with the achievements of our allies, but our contribution has been considerable and is rapidly increasing."

Paris Real Objective of German Recent Offense.

Washington, April 8.—Statements of German prisoners have convinced French military critics that the real objective of the great German offensive was Paris and that so far from expecting checks which would make Amiens the goal of bloody and undecided battles, the Teutonic high command sent its forces forward prepared for rapid advances in open warfare.

"order to alleviate the march of the troops," says an official dispatch received today from France, "the order was given to prepare for their departure and to organize the convoys in such a way as only to carry with them what was indispensable. The loading carriages, the munitions to be carried, the equipment and arming of the men all had been carefully planned as well as the distribution of maps of the country to be invaded. The men were to carry reserves of food, enough to last two days and two flasks, the usual food for a day, following them in rolling kitchens and provisions for three days in company conveyors.

"In short every arrangement shows that the German command had decided to resort to open warfare. It is certain that the military situation after more than 15 days of operations is one of extreme disappointment to the German command."

Notice to Timber Men

We have orders for 20,000 No. 1. cross ties from White Oak, Post, and Chestnut oak, standard specifications of 7"X8"X8 feet and 6 inches long, when sawed and 7"X7" hewed, same length as sawed.

We also have order for 5,000 No. 2 cross ties, to be any size under the above sizes, down to 6"X7" and length to be the same as for No. ones, also to be from above kinds of oak timber.

Almost all timber haulers already know the specification and we mention this for those who will be getting out timber this year who have not made ties before.

Also all this timber must be sound, all knots smoothed off with the tie and all bark peeled off when either sawed or hewed.

A great many haulers lose their grade by measuring with their axe handles and we would ask that you cut a pole exactly eight and one half feet long and make all ties according to this length, and notch it for 7 inches to get face and thickness.

At this time we also wish to thank the hundreds of people who sold their timber to us last year and beg to assure them of the same fair and courteous treatment for the coming season.

The price, effective February 1st is 60 cents each for No. 1 ties and 50 cents for second class.

For Red Oak, Spanish Oak, and all other kinds of oak (except the above mentioned kinds,) also Hickory and Ash we will pay 50 cents for No. 1's, and 40 cents for No. 2's, same specifications as above.
